Preschool Story 6

A man born blind (John 9)

Warm up to this story with some "Open-shut them" actions, covering and uncovering your eyes. If you have parents/carers and children together in your group encourage the children to stand behind their grown up and cover and uncover their eyes, as well as swapping and covering the children's eyes. During the story, at the start of each verse. Cover and uncover your own eyes on 'open' and cover your eyes on 'blind' or 'blindness'.

You may also want to introduce the actions on Spit (hand to mouth and 'spit' it away), mud (mime scooping up some dirt) and power ('stir' the pretend mud around in the palm of your hand, then open out both palms upwards.) Prepare this sequence before you start – or leave it til the end, practice it together, and tell the story a second time incorporating these actions. Children will always appreciate a repetition of a story.
